Your generosity is appreciated by both staff and children.

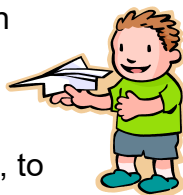

- Supporting work in various curriculum lessons by talking with children about what they are doing



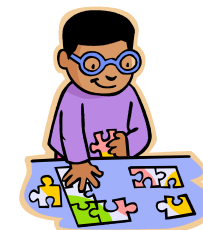
Practical jobs that need doing
